Rover P3

1949 60 sports saloon

The Rover Sixty and Rover Seventy-Five or Rover P3 series were 1.6 and 2.0-litre executive cars announced in the middle of February 1948 and produced by The Rover Company Limited until the (northern) summer of 1949. Two months after the announcement of the new cars "a new vehicle for agriculture" was announced, the Land-Rover, with the engine of the new Sixty.

Overview

For the post-war market Rover had a new engine that had been in preparation since the late 1930s with overhead inlet and side exhaust valves. It was made in two versions for the car, the Rover 60 had a four-cylinder unit of 1595 cc and the Rover 75 had a six-cylinder version of 2103 cc. The gearbox and traditional Rover <u>freewheel</u> were kept unchanged from the previous model.

To go with the engine a new car was prepared. Although the body was similar in styling to the Rover 12 and 16, many of the body panels were in fact new but the wings and bonnet from the 12 were carried over. The car was 0.5 inch (12 mm) wider outside than the 16 but by making better use of space this translated to 2.5 inches (60 mm) inside. It was 4.5 inches (115 mm) shorter in the wheelbase. Also new, and a first for a Rover, was independent front suspension but the brakes remained a hydraulic/mechanical hybrid system. Rather than having a complete chassis, the new frame, which was a box section, was stopped short of the rear axle and the rear semi-elliptic springs were attached to the body. This allowed the rear axle travel to be increased and an improved ride resulted.

Two body styles were available, a 6-light <u>saloon</u> and 4-light <u>sports saloon</u>. The 6-light <u>saloon</u> had a rear <u>quarter window</u> (sometimes referred to a 6-window <u>saloon</u>) while the 4-light <u>sports</u> saloon had the lack of the rear quarter window (sometimes referred to a 4-window saloon).

The cars were expensive at £1080 for the Rover 60 and £1106 for the Rover 75, and with early post-war production problems and material shortages it was never intended that the cars would be produced in large numbers. Eventually, 1274 of 60 and 7837 75 models were made before the car was replaced by the all-new Rover 75 (P4) at the end of September 1949.

Powertrain.

The <u>engine</u> and gearbox from the car were also used as the basis for those in the original <u>Land Rover Series</u>. About six "75" models were produced with triple SU carburettors – a throw back to Rover's pre-war 'Speed' performance models; one survivor has an over-bored 2,400 cc engine; the basis of the Marauder 100 engine.

Rover's new 75 was announced on 23 September 1949, it replaced this car.

The 90s are a coming.

The vehicles of 1990 will, in 3 years, be 30 years since date of manufacture and thus be eligible to be registered on HSV. This will be an interesting time for the Heritage Vehicle Movement as to what vehicles remain out there and just how original they will be. There where some very competitive vehicles produced in the 90's which will add a new dimension to what is now fast becoming a get up and go vehicle movement. Period accessories is an industry that boomed in the 80's and 90's, wheels of all shapes and sizes , get up and go motor accessories ,interior fittings especially seating . A lot of the vehicles are survivors because they where accessorised to suit the owner. Time for clubs to take into account the "Times they are a changing".

Old Road Warriors.

These old road warriors are damaged or used tyres. Some 25 million tyres are discarded in Australia every year. These discards are in the main illegally dumped, exported or stockpiled.

Has an Aussie start-up cracked how to make tyre recycling sustainable and profitable?

Melbourne based commercial innovator Green Distillation Technologies Corporation [GDT] has developed a process that heats whole end -of -life tyres from cars or trucks to finish up with highly marketable oil, carbon and steel. The technology is so cutting edge that GDT has become the *first ever Australian finalist in the Edison Awards*.

Like many economically critical but polluting industries, the big challenge for tyres has been creating an economically viable way to recycle products into commodity components that have a tangible value.

GDT Director Trevor bailey said that end-of-life tyres were a major problem for every government, they were built to be resilient, they can cause, air, water and ground pollution and they can damage landfill linings as trapped methane gas causes them to bubble to the surface. He said roughly 23% of tyres were recycled but this figure could include exporting tyres to burn in brick and cement kilns in "countries" that don't really care about their pollution" Like Bangladesh, India and Thailand. Methods of recycling, like crumbling or chipping, were too expensive to make the by-products from the tyres economic to sell. Mr Bayley said.

GDT's tyre recycling process is called destructive distillation and this is similar to pyrolysis, which uses heat and excludes air. However, under destructive distillation, controlled heat reduces whole tyres to their constituent elements which then reform into oils which are distilled and collected. Unlike pyrolysis, oils created through destructive distillation do not separate, the steel remains untouched since it does not get hot enough and high purity carbon is released in powder form. In addition the process is emission-free uses recycled oil as the heat source during production and the only waste generated is heat. Continued overleaf:

"A lot of people are doing similar things but this process is unique we use the whole tyre. Some people have to chip their tyres and that involves a more complex process than ours." Mr Bayley said.

The chief executive of GDT Craig Dunn is certainly not going o play down the valuable recognition the nomination for a global prize like the Edison award can bring to their business. The company had already had enquires from organisations in , Italy, USA, Romania, Japan, Singapore and Thailand.

Mr Dunn stated "we started in 2009 to prove our technology and the capability of the process, which represents the ultimate in recycling old tyres and more importantly generates a positive cash flow by selling the resulting carbon, oil and steel."

"It is the only process available in Australia that remanufactures the rubber from old tyres into a different energy form as the other recycling methods merely change the shape or appearance of the rubber."

Mr Bayley said there was strong demand for all three by-products and GDT could sell their oil many times over. The oil can be used by industry as a heating fuel, further refined into vehicle or aviation fuel, used directly in some stationary diesel engines or blended with fossil fuel."

A very interesting development, such innovative thought and so good it is Australian. End-of-life tyres are a very big problem to every local council often being dumped in remote council controlled areas by persons not prepared to pay the council dump receiving fee. Then there are many stockpiles of these end-of-life tyres some legal some illegal which are an ongoing hazard for people nearby and the environment. A bush fire in California USA was turned into a raging inferno with toxic fumes when an illegal tyre stockpile containing thousands of end-of-life tyres was ignited by the fire.



During the 20's and early 30's, Kate dominated the Sydney underworld with a gang of thugs carrying razors known as the razor gang. One of the scar faced gang members drove Kate in the Studebaker to her regular court appearances and funerals. Her opponent was Tilly Devine who kept an equally ruthless razor gang around her. Much has been written of Kate and the razor era, most recently "Razor" by Larry Writer.




