Not just another Anzac Day in Neville Village! 15th April 2018

Today, 15th April 2018, we woke up fairly early for a Sunday morning, to start our long drive from Cumnock to Neville Village, for the Veterans Sunday Commemoration.

Normally, it is held on the Sunday before ANZAC Day, at the Neville War Memorial Park. However, this year, in order to have the terrific 'Canobolas Highland Pipe Band' play for us, it had to be moved to an earlier date.

Unlike the previous days, which were dry, hot and humid, today, it was cold and windy. This was perfect for our Jeep, to prevent it from overheating! Don Marriott, owns a vintage military jeep and myself (Angelica from Malta) and Evie (ex-

farmhand, from Belgium), were fortunate enough to join him on this memorable day! We got all snug and cosy in his jeep and slowly started our voyage from Cumnock to Neville Town, where the Parade was to take place.

For those of you who are not familiar with the small village of Neville, I will give you a brief introduction. It is a small village of about 100 people. In the beginning, the village was known by different names. The first developments in the area were as early as the 1850s and in 1885 the original settlement was called Macquarie and known as Mount Macquarie. In 1888, 'Neville' became the official name.

Now back to the Parade! - The Parade was headed by the Canobolas Highland Pipe Band, followed by Return Soldiers, Cadets, school kids from Neville Public School, other people from the crowd and finally but not less important, was Don Marriot, with his military jeep and Bob McNeill and Graham Barrett with their army blitzes. They drove magnificently down the road with their triumphant military vehicles. Believe me, it was quite a show!

The Anzac Sunday Commemoration Service was organised by the Neville Public Hall Reserve Trust and at the conclusion of this service, we were all invited for an exquisite lunch.

I will not go in too much detail on what went on during the service. You will have to come down here next year and find out for yourself! In short, it involved an opening and welcoming by the Councillors, laying down of wreaths and children from the Neville Public School reading simple yet powerful prayers, for the Australian Defence Forces, for peace, for the Nation and Thanksgiving.

The Catafalque Party presented arms and the pipers and drummers from the Canobolas Highland Pipe band, enchanted us with their musical ensemble. Councillor David Kingham closed the ceremony with his benediction and we all stood up and sang The Australian National Anthem.

There is nothing better than a warm drink, hot food and delicious cakes to end such an eventful day! This was put together by the 1/19th Royal NSW Regiment.

Many people go into a lot of trouble and contribute to making this event a memorable one! It is impossible to mention everyone; however, I cannot not mention, Mr Scally Radburn, who was the organiser, the Neville Public School personnel and pupils, the Canobolas Highland Pipe Band, the Soldiers of D coy. I/19RNSWR and the Australian Air Force Cadets from 329 Squadron Orange. And of course, the military vehicle owners, annually, make it a point to keep this day free on their calendar and to have their vehicles top notch on the day!

As can be seen from the photos, everyone makes an effort to gather round and show thanks to the Returned Soldiers on this day. They did so much for us! And on this occasion we celebrated 100 years of Anzac - The Spirit Lives!! "Lest we forget'!

Kokoda, what it means to me.

It's the military history following in my relations footstep. The courage of the people like Bruce Kingsbury VC, Stan and Butch Busset, Ralph Honner, Capt. Templeton and Bert Kienzle who, with the help of the natives, help build the track. The action of these men and others should not be forgotten

My venture stated at a small airport, Popondetta, PNG, with 15 other trackers ranging in age from 22 to 69, 9 village porters and 1 batman (my personal helper) A short 3.5 hour drive in the back of a truck we arrived at Kokoda Village our starting point. After visiting the Bert Kienzle Memorial Museum and reading the history of the New Guinea campaign, the walking began. For the next 8 days we encounter numerous creek crossings 100's of slips, slides and falls mosquito's ,thunder storms , up and down countless mountains a few blisters and sleepless nights a hard slog .Just a little walk in the jungle, 129km I don't think I was ever dry.

On a brighter note we encounter many village (Isurava, Efogi Nauro to name a few) the villagers had so little material processions and yet they are so happy generous and content. They cared for and treated us like family (something which is lost in Australia) Our historian briefed us on the military history at various locations, Efogi, Templeton Crossing, Nauro and short moving service was held at Brigade Hill

My body is starting to feel the pressure of continuous exhaustion over the last 8 days, one step at a time, focus, don't lose concentration finally we reached Cameron's Corner. The track was completed we all survived

A short bus ride to the Bomana War Cemetery. Seeing the countless headstones at the cemetery was very moving. I went looking for the grave of private E Boaden (relative) and found it, a white marble headstone, immaculately keep and a simple inscription (a tear was shed)

Off to our first HOT shower in 8 days I had no doubt we were invincible, we had Plummeted to our worst lows and soured to great heights. There is nothing physically or emotionally we cannot endure. We set of as 24 individuals and Parted as mates.

G'day,

Thank you for your entry into the 2018 Autumn Tour. This letter is to bring you up to date on a few additional aspects of the tour, and to notify of a couple of minor changes to the Tour Schedule.

We will provide for early registration to the Tour with a desk at the Henry Parkes Centre from 3.00pm on Thursday 3rd May. Entrants who are in Parkes at that time may collect their Tour packages from our desk, which may allow for a couple of extra minutes sleep on Friday. The Henry Parkes Centre is at Parkes Visitor Information Centre on the Newell Highway on the Northern approach to or departure from (whichever way you are travelling) Parkes. Whilst at the Henry Parkes Centre, you may wish to view the delights of the Parkes Motor Museum and Greg Page's Elvis collection.

Tour Headquarters will be open at the Parkes Racecourse. The Racecourse is located on the Eugowra road on the Southern approach (or departure) from Parkes about 2 miles from the Orange –Parkes road. The first vehicles on Friday's Long Run will be flagged off from Tour HQ at 9.30am. There will be a cup of tea with sandwich and/or slice available for those waiting for the flag fall. Travel to Peak Hill will be a lightly trafficked route. Arrangements have been made for these entrants to purchase lunch, good coffee or snacks in Peak Hill. Alternatively they may proceed to the Parkes Radio Telescope where light snacks and good coffee will be available for purchase.

At 1.30pm, the first vehicles of the Short

Run will be flagged off. These will travel to the Radio Telescope via a generally lightly trafficked route. On arrival at the Radio Telescope, all vehicles will be marshalled into position in the Telescope parking area. As scientists will be observing from the Radio Telescope during the day, entrants are requested to minimise the time that motors are running, as unsuppressed ignition systems can disrupt the sensitive instruments used in observations. All participants in the Tour will be able to view the audio visual presentations at the Telescope at no cost, purchase quality coffee and snacks, or just wander around poking heads under bonnets.

We strongly recommend that you take advantage of the time at the Telescope to judge the vehicles, as we require judging forms to be returned before departure from Tour HQ on Saturday morning.

On Saturday 6th, Tour HQ will again be open from 7.30am, and a cup of tea will be available before vehicles are flagged off at 9.00am. After morning tea at Bogan Gate, there will be an option of a short or long run to Trundle. The short run is about 14 miles and is recommended for the slower vehicles, whilst the longer run is about 30 miles. Our objective is to have vehicles parked in the main street of Trundle before the ABBA train arrives at 11.30am.

The format of the ABBA Festival has changed from last

year, and the major entertainment is at a venue with entry ticketed at \$55 per person and lasting from 11.00am until 9.00pm. However, "unofficial" entertainment will be available at no, or modest, cost at other location/s in Trundle. One reason for trying to be in place before the train arrives is to allow ABBA spectators to view the Tour vehicles as they walk from the Train to the main venue.

On Saturday evening, we will be providing a bus from some of the accommodation in Parkes to the Services and Citizens Club, where the presentation dinner will be held. This bus will conduct one run, picking up at the Station Motel, Spanish Lantern Motor Inn, North Parkes Comfort Inn, Country Cabins, Parkes International Comfort Inn, Bushman's Comfort Inn, Moonraker Motel, with a second run to El Mexicali Motel, Parkview Motel and Motel Clarinda. Those who wish to avail themselves of this offer will need to advise the Club as soon as possible, with names and accommodation location, as it will be a case of first in, best dressed. The bus will pick up only from a given list for each accommodation site. Return runs will be provided at the conclusion of the presentation dinner at about 9.30pm.

On Sunday 6th,

Tour HQ will be open from 7.30am for a light breakfast. Those departing towards Orange may consider visiting the Parkes Aviation Museum (a satellite of HARS) at Parkes Airport on the way home.

Austin A70

The Austin A70 Hampshire and later Austin A70 Hereford are cars that were produced by Austin of Britain from 1948 until 1954. They were conventional body-on-frame cars with similar styling to the smaller A40 Devon and A40 Somerset models respectively. 85,682 were built. Most first generation A70s were Hampshire 4-door saloons, though some estate and pickup truck versions were also produced as the A70 Countryman and A70 Pick-up respectively. The 2.2 L (2199 cc) straight-4 pushrod engine provided the same power output, at 67 bhp (50 kW), as it had when installed in the earlier Austin 16 hp. The new car was nevertheless lighter and published acceleration and top speed figures were correspondingly brisker. Accelerating from 0-80 km/h (50 mph) took 14.5 seconds and the maximum speed was 83.3 mph (134.1 km/h). Production of the model ended in 1950 with 35,261 being built. In 1950 the UK price was £648, which included the heater.



The A70 Hereford replaced the Hampshire in 1950 and was wider and slightly longer with an extra 3 inches (76 mm) in the wheelbase. A new addition to the range was the A70 Coupe, a 2-door convertible with coachwork by Carbodies of Coventry. A notable mechanical change was the use of hydraulic brakes. The smaller A40 Somerset had similar styling and even shared the same door panels. The car retained the 2199cc 4-cylinder engine first seen officially in 1945 on the Austin 16. Performance was adequate by the standards of the time, but the car was not particularly quiet, and an Autocar magazine road test in 1950 reported a "small vibration at about 40 m.p.h. on the overrun" on their test car. Austin had given a lead after the war in equipping their cars with interior heaters at no extra cost, and the Hereford came fitted with "the latest Smiths fresh-air installation" as standard equipment. The road tester found the heater, like the engine and indeed the windscreen wipers, "rather noisy in operation", however. Sales were slow, with 50,421 having been produced when the A90 Westminster replaced it in 1954. A rare variant was a pickup, marketed as the A70 Pick-up. This shared the same platform as the estate, but with fully faired bodywork aft of the driving cab. The interior of this rather plush workhorse was the same as the saloon, with a large splitbench seat, and full instrumentation set in the middle for easy completion whether for left- or right-hand drive. An A70 tested by the British magazine *The Motor* in 1951 had a top speed of 80.5 mph (129.6 km/h) and could accelerate from 0-60 mph (97 km/h) in 21.4 seconds. A fuel consumption of 21.9 miles per imperial gallon (12.9 L/100 km; 18.2 mpg_{.11s}) was recorded. The test car cost £911 including taxes.


