A drop from the Council of Heritage Motor Clubs to keep you going

Council has taken some measures to minimise potential contact with the Covid 19 virus. Member Clubs may find measures similar to these relevant when planning or carrying out Club activities.

- The CHMC Annual General Meeting has been postponed until Saturday 24th October, and an application for this postponement has been made to the NSW Dept of Fair Trading.
- The Committee has resolved that any Officers whose term of office was due to end before 24th October will continue in office until then. This resolution is necessary for Council's continued functions to be performed legally.
- Face to Face contacts are now prohibited as the Chief Medical Officer's social distances or Government regulations must be observed.
- CHMC has insurance cover for public liability, members/volunteers and executive/management committee. Should it hold or promote events, contrary to advice from relevant government authorities, which expose members and the general public to risk, including that of infection, it is likely our insurers may take issue and disallow claims.
- Council will continue to provide services and disseminate information to its member
 Clubs, but the traditional means of doing this will necessarily change.
- Council will limit the use of surface contact (for example posting hard copies of documents, handling of cash or cheques) to those instances where electronic communication is not possible.
- Only where Clubs have been unable to provide Council with an email address, will
 contact instead be made by phone or surface mail.
- Clubs are encouraged to establish safe communication networks amongst members so that those with good electronic communication abilities may pass information to those with lesser or no such ability.
- Council will again contact member Clubs if any of the circumstances relating to management of Covid 19 change.

Two members have Humber Vogues



Vogue Series I/II/III/IV

The first generation **Singer Vogue** *I/II/III/IV* models of 1961 to 1966, was a badge engineered version of the Hillman Super Minx. Introduced in July 1961, it was positioned above the Super Minx and Singer Gazelle in the Rootes Group range, and had quadruple headlights as well as a more powerful 66 bhp (49 kW; 67 PS) version of the 1,592 cc (97.1 cu in) Minx engine. The Series II version for 1963 had front disc brakes as standard, changes to the interior, removal of the chrome bonnet strip and a change to amber front indicator lenses.^[1] The Series III of 1964 gained six light bodywork and an increase in power to 84 bhp (63 kW; 85 PS). The final version of this generation, the Series IV was introduced at the 1965 motor show^[1] and saw the engine size increased to 1,725 cc (105.3 cu in) although there was no change in power output. The first generation Vogue was offered as a four door saloon and as an estate car.

Australian production as the Humber Vogue

Humber Vogue Series III of 1965

The Vogue was also produced in Australia, by Rootes Australia, and was marketed as the **Humber Vogue**. ^[2] It was introduced in 1963 and was followed by the Vogue Sports which was fitted with a Sunbeam Rapier engine that provided a 35 percent increase in power to 85.5 hp (64 kW; 87 PS). ^[2] The Vogue Sports also featured improved suspension, brakes and wheels. ^[2]The Rapier-powered Vogue III was introduced in early 1965 at which time the Vogue Sports was discontinued. ^[3] Australian production of the Vogue ceased in 1966 following the takeover of Rootes Australia by Chrysler Australia.
